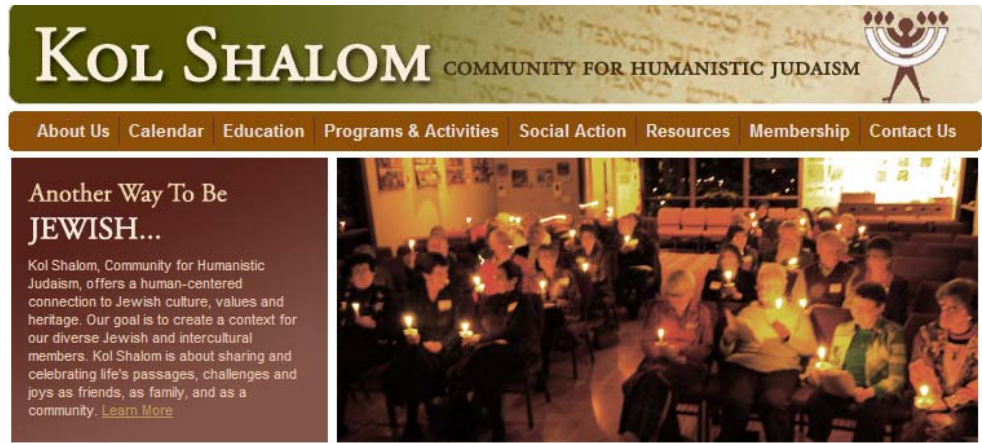

## KOL SHALOM'S SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS

**"COMMUNITY WRESTLES WITH ECONOMIC CRISIS"** was the Jewish Review's headline as they reported on the December 9th meeting of metro area Jewish agencies, schools and congregations, hosted by Neveh Shalom's social action committee. Our KS community was represented by board president, Roberta Hellman, CRC rep. Martin Heisler and SAC chair Myra Himmelfarb. We shared ideas for supporting the needy in the Jewish community and for working with others in the area to turn resources into the safety nets any of us could need in this economic downturn and winter of already harsh weather.

Spokespersons from Jewish Family & Child Services to Geshet and all of us between spoke of shrunken resources and big-hearted volunteer efforts. There was talk of needs — for food, housing and warmth, cooking lessons and child-care cooperatives, and also for "social justice". Social Justice implies systemic change so we'll see living-wage jobs, affordable housing, universally available health care, healthy food and good schools.

A Task Force will follow-up on these energetic ideas, meeting January 6th, 10AM at Shaarie Torah. Please feel free to comment on Kol Shalom's participation, through this newsletter, or our social action committee.

**HOPE TO HEAL THE HEALTH CARE SYSTEM** still holds the attention of our MACG working group. The Oregon Health Fund Board has submitted its report to the state Legislature. Our recommendations were heard; the report is fairly good, though full implementation will take nearly six years. Bills are now being written (supposedly to encompass the entire plan) by Rep. Mitch Greenlick and his House Committee. First response will be to make health care available for all children and to expand the Oregon Health Plan to be available for all low-income adults. This alone should bring in more federal

matching money, and our state tax system is being studied for further needed revenue.

The MACG group for Health Care is working jointly with the MACG Sustainability & Green Building committee, to train ourselves to communicate more effectively with city and state officials. We guess most Kol Shalom members are supportive of both causes, and invite comments, as well as more to join our efforts.

Of course, we are all aware of reform plans being "floated" nationally, one from our own Senator Wyden. Our January 11th "Sunday Forum" will focus on this issue, state and nationwide. We've requested a speaker from the senator's staff, and may have a person well-versed on the state's actions, leading to a Question and Discussion session for all of us. (see the Calendar)

Very locally, Kol Shalom continues to support **the SouthWest Community Health Center**, with our volunteer workers and more members asking how they can help. One way is with our muscles and boxing-up skills in January, when the clinic is moving to a new and larger building (200 feet away!). To volunteer, phone the clinic, Mondays through Thursdays, 503-977-0733, or our SAC, 503-245-9223. Also, Kol Shalom members have donated a total of over \$600, to keep the clinic eligible for its annual matching grant from the Maybelle Clark MacDonald Fund. The clinic thanks our donors and working volunteers!!!

**KEEPING THE SPOTLIGHT ON DARFUR** continues to engage our members. The postcard project continues, and this season of gift-giving is a time to think of funding solar ovens for families in African refugee camps. Contact SAC member Diane Koosed through our KS office.

## Children's Ed News

We had a parents meeting after the Nov. 23rd session. This was an opportunity for parents to give feedback about the program. Most of the parents were there and were quite positive regarding Karen and Leah's classes. A decision was made to add lessons in the basic Hebrew alphabet. Parents also agreed to come to at least one of the classes this year so they will better know the program and can become better ambassadors for us. Everyone agrees we would benefit by having more students. We have lost a couple of families who wanted different methods of teaching (Montessori, for example), but the majority of people we have feel the program is just right. We've had 2 phone inquiries about our program this past month.

The aleph-bet class is preparing for Hanukkah. They have made Hanukkah cards and will be participating in the Hanukkah party. I asked Jon if he would reprise his Martian Hanukkah play and he has put much effort into revising it to fit the kids we have this year. Thanks Jon. Rehearsals occurred during Sunday School. The mitzvah class is working on a new program this year in that rather than having a

second class meeting each month, the students and parents are scheduling a number of day activities related to being Jewish in Portland. A date was arranged to visit the Jewish Museum in Portland and get a guided tour but one of the students was sick and it is being rescheduled. Another visit now in the works is a visit to the offices of the Jewish Review to talk to reporters regarding Jewish stories and perhaps accompany them to an event.

We are so grateful that Elly Adelman has volunteered to chair the Hanukkah Party committee. All the Sunday School parents have agreed to do tasks. Jon has graciously volunteered once again to arrange the table games.
